

Official Proceedings of the Stutsman County Commission – April 16th, 2013

At 8:00 a.m., Chairman Klose called the mid-month meeting of the Stutsman County Commission to order. Dennis Ova, Dale Marks, David Schwartz, Craig Neys, and Mark T. Klose answered the roll call.

Jim Fettig, Courthouse Maintenance Supervisor, requested permission to advertise for Boiler Repair and/or Replacement. Jim stated he looked at an old bid specification book from a prior year to see how it should be put in and how it should run. He is looking for a non-proprietary boiler where it is only one company that can put it in and fix it if something goes wrong. Jim thought the boiler should be changed over in the spring and/or fall when the county does not need any heating or cooling. Ova made a motion, seconded by Schwartz to approve the request to advertise for boiler repair and/or replacement as requested. Motion Carried.

Casey Bradley, Auditor/COO, presented the commissioners with an ATM request for proposal (RFP) recommendation. At the March 28th, 2013 LEC Board meeting, Sheriff Kaiser, Administrator Trapp and Auditor/COO Bradley were selected as the committee to review the ATM request for proposals. On April 5th, 2013 three proposals for ATM services were opened. The three proposals were from Adam Carr of Carr Enterprises Inc., Jim Wheeler/Rich Poehls of Jamestown Music, and Thomas Nagel of Fraternal Order of Police (FOP). The Jamestown Music and the Fraternal Order of Police RFP's were not signed as required by Section 2.11 of the RFP document. The committee agreed to waive the signature requirement as they were both in letter format with the name of their owner or president at the bottom of the submittal and they would need to sign a formal contract if awarded the RFP. Jamestown Music submittal was removed from any further consideration after further review found that they failed to disclose the fees to be charged to the customers as it was an evaluation requirement of Section 5.0(C.). They also failed to submit the type of ATM being proposed, drawings and specifications as required in Section 6.0 and failed to indicate how the ATM would be monitored online as well as providing minimum service times for maintenance as required by section 6(2). The FOP proposal proposed a customer surcharge of \$2.00 per transaction and would share fees generated by the ATM on a graduated schedule. If less than 150 transactions per month the LEC would receive \$.50 per transaction; if over 150 transactions per month the LEC would receive .50 per transaction. The ATM would be connected wirelessly and would not require a data connection to be installed. They proposed monitoring the ATM online for issues that may arise and assured same day service calls when needed. If selected, they could have the ATM operational in about a month. The Carr Enterprise proposal proposed a \$2.50 customer surcharge per transaction and would share fees generated by the ATM on a flat \$1.00 per transaction. The ATM would connect wirelessly and would not need a data connection to be installed. They proposed monitoring the ATM online for issues that may arise and assured same day service calls when needed. If selected, they could have the ATM operational in about a month. Both ATM's are ADA compliant as was required by the request for proposal. It is the recommendation of the committee that Stutsman County award the ATM RFP to the Fraternal Order of Police. The FOP currently provides and services the vending machines in the Law Enforcement Center. It was the opinion of the committee that servicing and maintenance of the vending machines in the LEC has been exceptional and it is anticipated that this would be a similar level of service that we would see in the ATM contract. It is contingent upon the FOP providing a security plan that the Sheriff approves of and providing an insurance certificate before a contract is executed. Schwartz made a motion, seconded by Neys to approve the recommendation to award the contract to FOP as

presented. Roll call vote: Ova, Marks, Schwartz, Neys, Klose voted aye.

Bids were opened for lawn weed and feed service. Bids were as follows: Brian's Lawn Care – spring application with crabgrass conditioning for \$136.52, summer spraying for \$131.68, fall spraying for \$131.68 with a free soil testing; James River Pest Control and Green Lawn – three feedings for \$562.85 for the Courthouse and three feedings for \$562.85 for the Law Enforcement Center; Groundsman – \$661.00 for the Courthouse and LEC. Brian's Lawn Care did not provide a certificate of insurance which is a requirement on the bid specifications. It is the consensus of the board to table awarding the bids until the next commission meeting.

Jerry Bergquist, 9-1-1 Coordinator/Emergency Manager, requested acceptance of the Fiscal Year 2010 Homeland Security Supplemental Grant. The Homeland Security Grant had approximately \$400,000.00 of available leftover money and could purchase anything on a federally approved list. The only thing they funded statewide was radios. Jerry requested to purchase five portable radios for the LEC which costs approximately \$8500.00. It is 100% federal dollars and the purchases must be made by the end of June 2013. Ova made a motion, seconded by Marks to accept the Fiscal Year 2010 Homeland Security Supplemental Grant as presented. Motion Carried.

Dustin Bakken, Interim Tax Director, requested permission to contract with GIS Services. Last year, the agriculture land was valued by soil type. About a month after we finalized our agricultural land values in June, the NRCS rolled out their Harmonization Project. This project increased the soil types from 63 to 193 different soil types. Instead of using county lines as the boundary for soil map units, they split the state into five separate districts. Stutsman County was split from the northwest corner to the southeast corner. Essentially, the county has the same soils in two different sides of the boundary lines and two EI ratings. Last year the county used a web-based program called AgriData. The county extracted the data of the soil types using AgriData and put the information into our current computer system. Stutsman County will need to redo everything by the new soil types. The county does not have a permanent record of where the soil types are all at. About ten years ago, the county contracted with GIS Services. GIS is a mapping service using aerial pictures and build layers on top of that such as parcel layers that can overlay on top of aerial images. This has not been maintained for several years and would be a better option for the county. Dustin received two quotes from Sidwell and from GIS Workshop. The companies are proposing to clean up our current parcel layer, to make sure that the parcels are updated, and to overlay the new soils on top of that. Sidwell would cost approximately \$82,000.00 and GIS Workshop would be approximately \$42,000.00. Both companies are compatible with the new software system, Tyler Technology. GIS Workshop would split the cost over three years; \$17,000.00 to be paid the first and second years with the remaining to be paid the third year. The money is in the budget for this year. Once the county has a final product, we will look at the option to continue services with them and GIS would publish the data on the web for the county. The public would have access to the data as well. There is an annual maintenance fee of \$6400.00; \$4,000.00 of the annual fee is for annual telephone or GIS support. Schwartz made a motion, seconded by Marks to approve to enter in a contract with GIS Workshop and pay the contract over three years as presented. Roll call vote: Marks, Schwartz, Neys, Klose, Ova voted aye.

Bradley, Auditor/COO, presented a data agreement with Tyler Technologies and Stutsman County. This agreement gives Tyler Technologies access to our data and to be able to

manipulate the data once it is loaded in the new system. Neys made a motion, seconded by Ova to enter into the agreement as presented. Motion Carried.

Stutsman County received a letter from Joseph M. Schmitt requesting the information to be sent to the county commissioners. The letter expressed concerns with Endless Harvest and the potential of Stutsman County providing any funding through JSDC. Mr. Schmitt requested the commissioners not to support Endless Harvest. Commissioner Klose recommended forwarding the letter to the JSDC offices.

The County Commissioners received a letter from 281 Association requesting the county to take on the township road that runs on the south side of Interstate 94 from Titan Machinery to the campgrounds. The association did make a request to have the township pave the road and wanted the county to assist. The county sent Border States out for a quote which was in the amount of \$674,000.00. The quote was sent to Mr. Wiest since he requested it and they stated the businesses along the road were going to pay for the update.

Bradley, Auditor/COO, updated the board on Mr. Murphy. The commissioners allowed extending the date until April 5th, 2013 for Mr. Murphy to fill out an application for inundated land. Mr. Murphy did not turn in an application for inundated land.

Marks made a motion, seconded by Neys to approve the taxable meals and mid-month bills. Roll Call vote: Neys, Klose, Ova, Marks, Schwartz voted aye.
