

Official Proceedings of the Stutsman County Commission

April 19, 2011

At 8:00 a.m., Chairman Klose called the mid month meeting of the Stutsman County Commission to order. Dennis Ova, Dale Marks, David Schwartz, Craig Neys and Mark T. Klose answered roll call.

Steve Thompson, Interstate Engineering, reported that funding for 2010 ER projects had been released by NDDOT. All 2010 ER project funding requests needed to be submitted to NDDOT by September 1, 2011 or the funds would be returned to Federal Highway. Thompson presented two preliminary engineering contracts for Emergency Relief (ER) projects on County Highway 67 south of Cleveland. The estimate for the work on the curve was \$46,608.51 and \$50,226.98 for the area adjacent to Hehn-Schaffer Lake. Marks made a motion seconded by Neys to approve the contracts. Roll call vote – Ova, Marks, Schwartz, Neys and Klose voted aye. Contracts for work on these areas would not be completed until 2012. Emergency work could be done now – this work would be reimbursed 100%.

Commissioner Schwartz questioned whether or not the County should go ahead, repair inundated roads and not worry about compliance for ER funding. All the rules and regulations to qualify for funding raise the costs to the point that the County may be financially ahead to pay the cost and forego the 80% reimbursement. Thompson indicated that unless the jobs were completed to Federal regulations, all potential future Federal funds for that road would no longer be available.

Marks made a motion seconded by Ova to get authorization from NDDOT to do all emergency work necessary to get the county roads out of water as soon as possible. Roll call vote – Marks, Schwartz, Neys, Klose and Ova voted aye.

Thompson presented three preliminary engineering contracts for paving 2010 ER sites 9, 10 and 16 on County Highway 67 south of Cleveland in the amount of \$3,586.59 for each project. The plans would be developed for a November bid letting so the roads would be paved in 2012. If any spots were inundated next year, the projects could be pulled. Ova made a motion seconded by Schwartz to approve the contracts. Roll call vote – Schwartz, Neys, Klose, Ova and Marks voted aye.

Thompson reviewed alternatives for the Ypsilanti Bridge replacement project. Cost estimates for each alternative were 1) for a narrower bridge \$840,000, 2) same size bridge \$865,000, and 3) for a bridge with a middle pier \$850,000. The consensus was to go with a same size bridge – this choice was made so that the project concept report could be closed out. Because the bridge was still a safe solid bridge, replacement could be held off for now. A motion was made by Marks seconded by Schwartz to table the bridge replacement for an extended period of time. Motion carried.

Thompson reported that plans for the Gavilon road were progressing with a bid date of May 17, 2011.

Chad Kaiser, Stutsman County Sheriff, reported on a CIS software program that was compatible with mobile data computers. A \$21,000 grant had funded purchase of the terminals and software. \$6,000 per year was need for support, maintenance and program updates. The system allowed officers in the field to access information that would normally require dispatch to access. Ova made a motion seconded by Schwartz to authorize the additional \$6,000 for support and maintenance. Roll call Vote - Neys, Klose, Ova, Marks and Schwartz voted aye.

Connie Ova, CEO-JSDC, presented a request of \$117,500 by Gavilon Group, LLC for new jobs training/JSDC jobs incentive funds for their new wholesale liquid fertilizer facility in Midway Township. The application was for a forgivable loan from JSCD for \$55,000, 1% interest – 10 year amortization secured by new jobs training funds; an additional amount of up to \$62,500 jobs incentive grant (match of 50% employee up to the first 5 full time employees) provided upon proof of hiring employees paid equal to or more than \$15 per hour for 40 hours/week. The project would be funded 80/20 County/City. Marks made a motion seconded by Schwartz to approve \$94,000 in County funds. Roll call vote – Klose, Ova, Marks, Schwartz and Neys voted aye.

Ms. Ova presented a request for matching dollars for a feasibility study for a Controlled Environment Agriculture (CEA) leaf lettuce production facility. The \$75,000 request would match a ND Ag Products Utilization Commission (APUC) grant. The funding would be 80/20 County/City. Steve Froehlich presented information on the potential for growing lettuce in the Midwest. The project would be developed in three phases over a two to three year period with a target production of 34 million heads of lettuce per year. The facility projects 62 employees with half of the employees in the technology field. Marks made a motion seconded by Schwartz to

approve \$60,000 in County funds. Roll call vote - Ova – aye; Marks – aye; Schwartz – aye; Neys – nay; and Klose – aye.

Jim Boyd made a presentation on the 22 member delegation that went to Denmark with representatives of Great River Energy to visit a cellulosic ethanol facility operated by Inbicon. The purpose of the trip was to learn more about using biomass for energy. He thanked the County for their support. There needed to be more work with local producers. GRE had plans for a 50 million gallon corn stover cellulosic plant by 2014.

Commissioner Schwartz reviewed the motor grader bids that were opened last meeting. The net cost was very similar for all 3 machines. He recommended purchasing the new CAT machine at a net cost of \$256,633. Schwartz indicated that the CAT machine had 2 gallons per hour better fuel consumption and with \$4 fuel over a holding period of 7,500 hours that was another reason for his recommendation. Marks made a motion seconded by Schwartz to purchase the CAT machine. Marks – aye, Schwartz – aye, Neys – nay, Klose – aye and Ova – aye.

Noel Johnson announced his retirement, effective as soon as possible, from all of his County positions: County COO, County Auditor, Director of Tax Equalization, Zoning Administrator, Risk Manager, and Superintendent of Schools Designee.

The Commission reviewed the revised job descriptions for the County Treasurer and County Recorder.

Johnson also stated that combining some offices had been discussed. The combining of the Treasurer's and Recorder's offices would be doable after visiting with Jacki Lindell the Deputy Treasurer. Johnson stated that sharing staff had been encouraged over the past several years. The job description would need to change. There most likely would be a treasurer/recorder with a deputy treasurer and a deputy recorder. There were some issues that would need to be worked out. Commissioner Schwartz questioned if they were to combine the two offices would they still be looking at having two department heads or have only one that would be in charge over the whole office. Johnson said details were not fully worked out yet but most likely there would be one department head (Treasurer/Recorder) with a deputy treasurer and a deputy recorder. The departments were separate in the past because the positions were elected. The Home Rule Charter has done away with that, the department heads were now appointed not elected. The Commission needs to think more corporate style of management and to consider what was in the best interest for the taxpayer. Johnson stated that there was no need of two department heads for four people. The one department head could move their staff around as needed on a day to day basis. This department head would still answer to the COO.

The COO deals with people that come into the Courthouse daily with questions and also in helping the department heads deal with day to day issues – not in control but helping with the daily decisions for the Commission because the Commissioners are not able to hold a meeting everyday to deal with issues that come up. The Commissioners are the boss, Johnson stated he has always recognized that and that he does not usurp their authority but we have to do business everyday. The COO works with department heads on a daily basis and assists the Commission with those daily decisions.

Commissioner Klose questioned Johnson if they would still be able to advertise for positions as they are now and if a right person was interviewed that could fit into a combined department (if that decision made) if they could hire as such. Johnson said he thought that that was a very good idea the only thing is that there would be a transitional period. He said that at the present time Jacki Lindell is the Deputy Treasurer and the only person in that office. She has done a great job but you need to get a treasurer and another full time person in that department to get training in place during the slower period. Jamie Anderson-Ruff, currently the Deputy Recorder, is doing a good job but that office still has two people working in it so the urgency was not as great.

Neys made a motion seconded by Ova to approve the change in job descriptions. Marks mentioned that at the meeting two weeks ago it had been approved to advertise for the treasurer, recorder and a general coordinator. Commissioner Klose stated that it was decided that the Chief Operating Officer would have control over those duties and that the general coordinator idea would just be eliminated.

The motion was clarified that there would be an advertisement for a treasurer and a recorder with the idea that that person could be hired for both duties if it were made into a combined department.

Jamie Anderson-Ruff stated that when she first starting working in the recorder's office there were three people in the office and now they are down to two. The recorder's position itself is a full time position and if we combine the offices who would be training this new person for the

recorder's duties? Klose said that flexibility was what the Commission was looking to attain, it would have to be decided. Ruff stated that wouldn't it be more efficient to have a department head in each department. Klose said that this was what the Commission would be looking at – the efficiency and the economics behind staff.

Lindell questioned one line in the new job description based on duties as stated in the NDCC. Johnson said that he had no problem with the wording change. Wording change was ok with Neys and Ova that had made the motion.

Roll call vote (job description changes): Marks – aye, Schwartz – aye, Neys – ayes, Klose – aye, and Ova – aye.

Ova made a motion seconded by Neys to approve the Beer Application and Sunday Beer Permit for Jamestown Speedway. Motion carried.

Neys made a motion seconded by Schwartz to grant the site authorization for the ND Buffalo Foundation at the Anchor Bar, the Buchanan Bar and the 281 Stop. Motion carried.

Ova made a motion seconded by Neys to grant the raffle permit for the Buffalo City Gun Club and to grant the raffle permit for Dakota Motocross. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Marks and seconded by Neys to approve payment of \$167.50 in taxable meals and payment of the mid-month bills. Roll call vote – Schwartz, Neys, Klose, Ova and Marks voted aye.

Nellie Degen requested that the County assist residents with the cost of sand bags and hauling of gravel and bags. Klose stated that the County has no personnel available to assist the private sector. Klose said to keep track of your personal expenses if FEMA comes through with assistance. Johnson reported that the County did not receive any reimbursement for assistance that was given in previous years to help protect private property. The Corp of Engineers, those Federal Agencies can only protect public infrastructure. Public funds are to protect public property only. Klose asked if any Commissioner would like to make a motion to spend money for private assistance. Klose called for a motion three times, no motion made.

Commissioner Schwartz requested permission to review and present to the Commissioners at the next meeting a proposal on allowing private haulers to haul out of the County gravel pits. Permission to review was granted.

Schwartz said that he had been contacted by the water board regarding two dams that had illegally been placed by Audubon and had been ordered by the water board to remove them which they are disputing and has caused flooding to County Road 42 and 63. Schwartz will contact State's Attorney Fremgen for possible follow-up by the County.

Schwartz made a motion seconded by Ova to adjourn. At 9:48 a.m., the mid month meeting of the Stutsman County Commission was adjourned.
