

Official Proceedings of the Stutsman County Commission – May 2, 2017

At 4:00 p.m., Chairman Klose called the regular meeting of the Stutsman County Commission to order. David Schwartz, Denny Ova, Craig Neys, and Mark T. Klose, answered the roll call. Absent was Dale Marks.

Neys made a motion, seconded by Ova to approve the Minutes of the April 2017 meetings. Motion carried.

Jason Bitz, Insure Forward, provided an accounting of the County's Policy information, giving a comparison from 2016 to present. Schwartz made a motion to approve the 2017 Insurance policies as presented, seconded by Neys. Roll call vote: Ova, Schwartz, Neys, and Klose voted aye. Motion carried.

Connie Ova, Jamestown Stutsman Development Corporation (JSDC), addressed the board regarding a Bank of North Dakota Infrastructure Loan Application, which could be used for new rail for the soybean processing plant that is being constructed. The County will need to apply for the loan. An agreement would then be drafted between the County and JSDC. A motion to approve the Rail Loan Application was made by Neys, seconded by Schwartz. Motion carried.

Fritz Fremgen, State's Attorney presented his monthly report.

Fremgen provided the board with a second reading of the Stutsman County Ordinance 2017-01, Prohibitions on Open Burning During a Red Flag Warning or While the Stutsman County Fire Danger Rating is Very High or Extreme and the penalty section. Fremgen stated he has not received any phone calls etc. against enacting this ordinance. Jerry Bergquist, Emergency Manager/ 9-1-1 Coordinator has not received any complaints regarding the ordinance either, stating he has only received positive feedback. Ova made a motion to approve and enact Stutsman County Ordinance 2017-01 pertaining to open burning as presented with an effective date of today, seconded by Schwartz. Roll call vote: Schwartz, Neys, Klose, and Ova voted aye. Motion carried.

Fremgen requested the board approve a Stipulation in the case of the US v. Lance Allen. Allen owes the Federal Government money, and the County has a tax debt on the property as well. Property Assessment will collect the debt and put the county first to collect the delinquent money owed. Schwartz made a motion to allow Fremgen to sign the Stipulation in the case of the US v. Lance Allen, seconded by Neys. Motion carried.

Jerry Bergquist, Emergency Manager/ 9-1-1 Coordinator, addressed the board with concerns about a Century Link cable that was cut on April 21, 2017. The cable was cut outside of West Fargo, but affected Jamestown and Valley City areas, causing all Century Link customers to lose long distance service. Bergquist would like the commission to consider writing a letter to Century Link who is under the Public Service Commission, making a complaint that there is no back up. Other telephone companies in the area have a backup. Businesses cannot carry on

normal business, without this service. Damages are estimated in the thousands of dollars in lost revenue. In the last two years there have been three cable cuts. When there are cuts in the line it takes quite some time to find where the break is located. The Jamestown Chamber is also considering a complaint to the Public Service Commission. The commission requested a letter be drafted and brought back up at another meeting to discuss further.

Mickey Nenow, Road Superintendent, provided the commission with his monthly report, where they are doing crack sealing and working on culverts. Nenow stated they will be leaving road restrictions on for a while yet.

Nenow requested the commission award the overlay for the Highway 43 project Excel Energy is funding to Border States, as they had the low bid of the three bidders. Ova made a motion to award Border States the construction engineering on Highway 43 contingent on proper payment from Excel Energy, seconded by Schwartz. Roll call vote: Neys, Klose, Ova, and Schwartz voted aye. Motion carried.

Nenow requested the commission approve the DOT Resolution for Project No. SC-4706 (062) 9 miles north of Woodworth, E HMA overlay – 7.145 miles to Border States, as they were the low bid of eight bidders, which will save on the Federal Aid being borrowed. Schwartz made a motion, seconded by Neys to approve the DOT Resolution for Project No SC-4706 (062) as presented. Roll call vote: Klose, Ova, Schwartz, and Neys voted aye. Motion carried.

Nenow recommended the board award the Construction Engineering for Highway 44 overlay for Project No. SC-4706 (062) to Interstate Engineering, as recommended by the selection committee. A motion was made by Neys, seconded by Ova to award the Construction Engineering for Highway 44 overlay for Project No. SC-4706 (062) to Interstate Engineering. Roll call vote: Ova, Schwartz, Neys, and Klose vote aye. Motion carried.

Nenow gave an update on the lighting on Ypsilanti & Pingree turns. The State is going to handle this project now and the County will not be participating in these projects anymore.

At 4:44 p.m., the Stutsman County Commission Meeting recessed for the County Park Board Meeting.

Houge made a motion to approve the minutes of the April 2017 meeting, seconded by Woodward. Motion carried.

Houge made a motion to approve the monthly bills, seconded by Schwartz. Roll call vote: Schwartz, Neys, Klose, Houge, Woodward, and Ova vote aye. Motion carried.

Tom Tracy addressed the board at the request of Eric Nordstrom, who contacted him regarding writing a grant to update playground equipment at the Spiritwood Campground. The land is owned by Stutsman County. Tracy has written a few grants for the Kensal Public School, where he is the Superintendent. Tracy provided some pictures and cost estimates for the board to consider, as well as explained the need for a Resolution from the entity; that being Stutsman County, if he will be writing the grant. Neys made a motion, seconded by Schwartz to allow Tom Tracy to apply for a grant to update playground equipment at the Spiritwood Campground. Motion carried.

Discussion was held regarding reinstating the Senior Pass camping at Jamestown Reservoir. The average cost is \$9.00/camper, with County revenue at approximately \$4.00/camper. Senior Passes are part of a federal program that the county has to either opt in or out of. A motion was made by Neys, seconded by Ova to reinstate the Senior Pass on a trial basis for one year and split the fee based on the distribution stipulated in the contract the county has with each concessionaire. Roll call vote: Neys aye, Klose aye, Houge nay, Woodward aye, Ova aye, Schwartz, nay. Motion carried.

Discussion was held regarding the Parkhurst Concessionaire. A motion was made by Schwartz, seconded by Houge to allow the County Park Superintendent and County Auditor to work out an agreement with Tisa to collect the camping fees.

Marlyn Bertsch, Park Superintendent gave his monthly report, stating they are working on getting docks out and inquired about purchasing a generator and a set of pallet forks. A motion was made by Schwartz, seconded by Ova to purchase a generator and a set of pallet forks. Roll call vote: Klose, Houge, Woodward, Ova, Schwartz, and Neys voted aye. Motion carried.

Bertsch mentioned the deadline to submit applications for park positions is May 8, 2017.

A brief discussion was held regarding the need for a restroom at the park office, as well as isolating a waterline at Pelican Point.

At 5:17 p.m., a motion to adjourn the Stutsman County Park Board meeting was made by Schwartz, seconded by Houge. Motion carried.

At 5:17 p.m., the Stutsman County Commission Meeting reconvened.

Schwartz made a motion seconded by Neys to approve the monthly bills. Roll call vote: Ova, Schwartz, Neys, and Klose voted aye. Motion carried.
