At 8:00 a.m., Chairman Klose called the mid month meeting of the Stutsman County Commission to order. Dennis Ova, Dale Marks, David Schwartz, Craig Neys and Mark T. Klose answered roll call.

Robin Iszler, Central Valley Health District Administrator, presented the 2012 budget for review. Revenues showed changes for income from environmental health services (restaurant inspections), grants to support activities and a decrease in federal aid. Expenditure projections increased by \$71,000, with a new phone system being considered, increases of travel costs, computer maintenance, audit costs and insurance.

Iszler also stated that Central Valley Health had been awarded a \$35,000 Community Health Improvement Plan grant. The District was only one of 12 across the country to receive this grant.

A motion to approve the budget as presented was made by Ova and seconded by Schwartz. Motion carried. The joint Logan County/Stutsman County Commission meeting to finalize the budget would be held on September 6, 2011.

Marks made a motion seconded by Neys to approve the raffle permit for the Ypsilanti Community Club. Motion carried.

A motion to approve the liquor license for Cork & Barrel Liquors of Jamestown on the Stutsman County Fair Grounds was made by Neys and seconded by Schwartz. Motion carried.

Toni Hible, County Tax Director, presented a tax abatement request for parcel #84-9702700, Auditor's Lot 36-5, Lands in Spiritwood Lake City in GL 6 BE ½ Section 36 T142N R63W. The request was to decrease the valuation for 2010 from \$45,200 to \$35,300, a decrease of \$9,900. Spiritwood Lake City had approved the abatement. A motion to approve the abatement was made by Schwartz and seconded by Neys. Roll call vote – Ova, Marks, Schwartz, Neys and Klose voted aye.

Hible also reviewed the fees that were charged to townships where the County does the appraising and it was decided to make no change for the coming year.

Linda Chadduck, Interim Recorder, requested permission for the two Deputy Recorders to be able to perform wedding ceremonies during the workday based on the availability of staff and a place to perform the ceremony. The NDCC allowed a fee of \$30.00 that would go to the County. Neys made a motion seconded by Ova to allow marriages to be performed during the workday. Motion carried.

Neys made a motion seconded by Schwartz to appoint Lt. Teresa Brecto (The Salvation Army), Chad Kaiser (County Sheriff), Matthew Leitner and Randy Dullum (Jamestown Regional Airport), Amy Mayer (Regional Environmental Health Practitioner) and Rick Woehl (Jamestown Rural Fire Dept.) to the Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC). Motion carried.

Jerry Bergquist, 9-1-1 Coordinator/Emergency Manger, provided an update on flood information. The original Presidential Disaster Declaration closed on July 20 any damages after this date would have to fall under a new emergency declaration. The City of Kensal had declared an emergency on August 11, 2011 from damages received from heavy rains in that city. Mickey Nenow, County Highway Superintendent, reported that roads around Kensal were under water. Bergquist said that FEMA had adjusted reimbursement percentages on August 9, 2011 to 90% Federal, 7% State and 3% County. The present elevation of the Jamestown Reservoir was 1449.6 feet, with projected elevation reaching 1452 feet. The Pipestem's present elevation was 4787.8 feet, with projected elevation reaching 1490 feet. The releases from both dams would be increased to a combined 2000 cfs. The dams needed to have the flood control pool down before winter. Johnson stated that letters had been sent to cabin owners informing them about the predicted reservoir levels.

One bid had been received for the bid opening for ER Project 47-4. The re-bid project estimate was \$260,000 with no rip-rap. State's Attorney Fremgen opened the bid. He declared the bid void because no bidders bond was received. The necessity of the bidder's bond was discussed and Fremgen stated that a performance bond would definitely be required even if they elected to waive the bidder's bond requirement in the future.

Nenow reported that Spiritwood Lake City requested an additional culvert be placed on County Road 62 just north of County Road 42 to move more water from the lake before freeze up. The City was willing to pay half the cost of the culvert. A motion was made to Schwartz and seconded

by Marks to allow the additional culvert. Roll call vote – Marks, Schwartz, Neys, Klose and Ova voted aye.

Mr. Nenow also requested permission to advertise for a shop foreman at the Road Department and to also advertise for a blade operator for Montpelier. Schwartz made a motion seconded by Neys to advertise for the positions. Motion carried.

Nenow also reported that County Road 44 was under water and at this point was beyond a grade raise as repair. Options for a detour route to the north and possible drainage were being considered. Water was also over County Road 44 near Woodworth.

Marks made a motion seconded by Schwartz to pay \$215.00 in taxable meals. Roll call vote - Schwartz, Neys, Klose, Ova and Marks voted aye.

Schwartz made a motion seconded by Ova to pay the mid-month bills as presented. Roll call vote-Neys, Klose, Ova, Marks and Schwartz voted aye.

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Auditor Johnson reported that reimbursements for the 2009 and 2010 ER receivables had recently been received.

Johnson also reported that 16 applications had been received for the COO/Auditor's position. The commission had received copies of the applications and each were requested to review and pick candidates that they were interested in interviewing by the special meeting on Friday, August 19, 2011. A point system for evaluation would be established.

Johnson stated that budget meetings would also be starting.

Marks made a motion seconded by Schwartz to adjourn. At 9:07 a.m., the mid month meeting of the Stutsman County Commission was adjourned.
