Official Proceedings of the Stutsman County Commission— August 20, 2024

At 9:00 a.m., Chairman Klose called the regular meeting of the Stutsman County Commission to order. Jerry Bergquist, Chad Wolsky, Joan Morris, Levi Taylor, and Mark Klose were present.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Alyssa Looysen, JSDC, Director of Business Development, presented a Flex PACE 2024 program split funding request of \$158,000 from the county, and \$116,000 from the city to complete the remainder of projects scheduled for 2024. A motion to approve the request was made by Bergquist, seconded by Wolsky. Roll call vote: Bergquist, Wolsky, Morris, Taylor, and Klose voted aye. Motion carried.

Jim Wentland, Road Superintendent, presented a discussion on a water management project in Deer Lake, which runs parallel to County Road 62. Wentland's plan is to dig a mile-long trench that will run from Deer Lake to Pipestem Creek to remove 2-3 feet of water off Deer Lake to clear water on County Roads 67 & 42. Wentland stated that he has obtained a year-long permit, with the option to extend, from Fish & Wildlife to dig through their easement for the temporary drain. Wentland is working with Fish & Wildlife and the State Water Board to install a permanent outlet and stated that the approximate cost of the project would be \$692,197.72. Taylor and Wolsky wanted more information on the cost of the temporary drain from the last time it was done. Wentland stated that it would take about a month to dig the trench and that he is looking to do the project in the fall. Klose stated that more information is needed on cost, outside participants, pumping, and budgeting before approving the trench.

Mike Gunsch, Houston Engineering, presented an update on the Crystal Springs feasibility study where he laid out the 10 phases of the project that is estimated to cost around \$222,000 with a local share of \$122,900 and the remaining \$99,100 to be fulfilled by the potential WEB grant. If the county was not granted the WEB grant and was unable to identify stakeholders, Gunsch stated that the county has the option to reject the project after not receiving the funds. Bergquist inquired about who the owner of the project would be. Joel Lees, Water Resource Board Chairman, stated that the county should pay for the project so that they can be the owner of the feasibility study and look for reimbursements from private entities and townships rather than having the water resource district levy for the funds. Gunsch clarified that the water resource district and the county would be co-owners of the study. Chairman Klose appointed Commissioner Bergquist to the steering committee. A motion to allow the Water Resource Board to make other appointments for the steering committee was made by Bergquist, seconded by Taylor. Roll call vote: Wolsky, Morris, Taylor, Klose, and Bergquist voted aye. Motion carried.

Jessica Alonge, Auditor/COO, requested to change the date for the final budget hearing from October 8 to October 7 at 6 p.m.

Alonge presented the early vote center dates and hours for the general election. Alonge requested to open the Courthouse for early vote on Saturday, November 2 from 9 a.m. - 1 p.m. A motion to add Saturday to early vote was made by Morris, seconded by Wolsky. Motion carried.

At 10:24 a.m., the Commission meeting recessed for the Stutsman County Park Board meeting.

Official Proceedings of the Stutsman County Park Board - August 20, 2024

At 10:24 a.m., Chairman Klose called the regular meeting of the Stutsman County Park Board to order. Jerry Bergquist, Chad Wolsky, Levi Taylor, Mark Klose, Joan Morris were present. Merri Mooridian and Henry Steinberger were present via phone.

Karl Bergh, Park Superintendent, presented an update on the playground equipment at Lakeside Park. Bergh stated that the playground equipment has reached its life expectancy and is no longer usable. Bergh would like to submit a grant request from Garrison Diversion. Morris stated her hesitancy due to the area of playground equipment being installed being a shared property with the Farmer's Union camp. Farmer's Union asked that they consider helping with the cost of the equipment. Wolsky suggested putting an agreement into place between Farmer's Union and Stutsman County giving the county final say over the equipment on the shared land. Bergquist stated that this year could focus on the removal of the outdated equipment and then replacing the equipment in the spring. Taylor suggested having the Park Portfolio have a grant proposal prepared and meet with Farmers Union and present it to the Commission.

Bergquist brought forth an article that was released by the Jamestown Sun about the ground squirrel infiltration west of Ave Maria and questioned whether the Park Board or Bureau of Reclamation currently owned the land. Bergh stated that the Park Board manages the land, but the Bureau retained the property. Mooridian suggested looking into the contracting with the USDA about the infestation.

Morris asked Mike May, Interstate Engineering, about the island bridge. May stated that the project was moved by the DOT to 2026 due to funding sources. Morris stated that this project is being partially funded through the ARPA fund and that the funds need to be spent by the end of 2026. Alonge clarified that the grant for the box culvert was through the DOT and the bid date was moved to 2025, but due to the ARPA funds, the county needs a signed contract and bid date before the end of 2024.

Mooridian stated that Bergh would not be able to order any playground equipment if he was seeking a Garrison Diversion grant for the project. The grant due dates are September 1, 2024, or April 1, 2025. A motion for Bergh to apply for the Garrison Diversion Grant by September 1 was made by Berquist, seconded by Steinberger. Motion carried.

A motion to approve the mid-month bills was made by Mooridian, seconded by Taylor. Roll call vote: Morris, Taylor, Klose, Mooridian, Steinberger, Bergquist, and Wolsky voted aye. Motion carried.
