

Official Proceedings of the Stutsman County Commission – October 3, 2017

At 4:00 p.m. Chairman Klose called the regular meeting of the Stutsman County Commission to order. Dennis Ova, Dale Marks, David Schwartz, Craig Neys, and Mark T. Klose answered the roll call.

Neys made a motion to approve the minutes of the September meetings, seconded by Ova. Motion carried.

Jessica Alonge, Interim Recorder/Deputy Auditor, introduced the new Deputy Recorder, Maureen Finley. Maureen was already working for Stutsman County in dispatch.

A letter was received to appoint a North Dakota State Fair delegate for the County. Ova made a motion, seconded by Schwartz to appoint Neys as the ND State Fair Delegate. Motion carried.

Jerry Bergquist, Emergency Manager/9-1-1 Coordinator was present to discuss the CenturyLink cable cut that occurred on September 19, 2017. On June 16, 2017, the Chamber of Commerce had sponsored a meeting of all telephone companies and a number of chamber members, along with public safety officials regarding previous cable cuts and the issues they have caused. The most recent cable cut occurred while another cable company was doing excavation. Locate was called, but the CenturyLink cables weren't identified. CenturyLink, Dakota Central Communications and Dakota Carrier Network have signed an agreement to create a redundant link for all CenturyLink subscribers. They plan to start the redundant link project soon. Senator John Grabinger and Joan Morris, Controller of Agri-Cover, were both in attendance and voiced concerns. It was the consensus of the Board to have Bergquist monitor the progress of the project and if issues weren't resolved revisiting whether to send a letter to the Public Service Commission.

Jim Fettig, Courthouse Maintenance Supervisor, requested permission to replace the front courthouse doors. This project was budgeted for last year, but he wanted to get the steps done first. Fettig received a proposal from House of Glass in the amount of \$9,689.00 for both doors. A motion to approve and replace both doors was made by Schwartz, seconded by Marks. Roll call vote: Ova, Marks, Schwartz, Neys and Klose voted aye. Motion carried.

Fettig spoke about leveling the ground on the boulevard. The Road Department is going to assist taking out old tree stumps.

Railing has been ordered for the new front steps. The project deadline is November 1, 2017.

Fritz Fremgen, State's Attorney, presented his monthly report. There are 209 open felonies so far this year. The record is about 245 open felonies in a year. Fremgen is trying to settle cases faster. Social Services would like an attorney present at their child protection team meetings; however, a State's Attorney will not be attending due to the need of getting things done in the office.

Fremgen requested travel authorization for the Victim Advocate to a grant-funded training in Oregon in December 2017. Marks made a motion, seconded by Ova to approve the travel authorization request for the Victim Advocate. Motion carried.

Senator John Grabinger spoke to the commission regarding the clean-up of the James River. Grabinger and Senator Terry Wanzek contacted the Governor’s Office after the Stutsman County Water Board’s request for a \$50,000 match grant to the State Water Commission was denied. The Governor’s Office has discretionary funding of community development block grant (CDBG) money that the City or County can apply for. The South Central Regional Council would apply for the grant through the Department of Commerce on behalf of the County or City. The grant would be \$50,000 and a 50% match would be required. It was discussed that the County could be the lead agency to apply for the grant and then have discussions with the City and other entities to find match funds. Schwartz made a motion for the County to be the lead agency to apply for the grant, seconded by Marks. Motion carried.

Nicole Meland, Interim Auditor/COO, proposed setting an appraisal hearing date on October 17, 2017, regarding the properties that are in the foreclosure process. All foreclosure properties have until the day of the sale to pay all past due taxes in full. Marks made a motion to set the proposed date, seconded by Schwartz. Motion carried.

At 4:50 p.m., the Stutsman County Commission Meeting recessed for the County Park Board Meeting.

At 4:55 p.m., Chairman Klose called the regular meeting of the Stutsman County Park Board to order. Mark Klose, Jason Houge, Robert Woodward, Dennis Ova, Dale Marks, and David Schwartz answered the roll call.

A motion was made by Ova, seconded by Houge to approve the minutes of the September meeting. Motion carried.

A motion was made Houge to approve the monthly bills, seconded by Woodward. Roll call vote: Marks, Schwartz, Neys, Klose, Houge, Woodward, and Ova voted aye. Motion carried.

Marlyn Bertsch, County Park Superintendent, presented his monthly report. They are still cleaning up around the shop, cutting down dead trees and removing some stumps. Bertsch received a request at Lakeside Marina Campground for benches in the shower rooms for people with disabilities.

Commissioner Schwartz discussed a new office building for the Park Department. Schwartz found a 2010 “skid-house” which is finished on the inside with heat, air conditioning, a water heater and propane tank. Purchase price on a delivered skid-house with water and electric hookup is \$9,200.00 and

can be delivered in two weeks. In return, the company will also pick up the used tires located at the park shop and dispose of them for free. Houge made a motion to approve the skid-house for the office building for the Park Department, seconded by Ova. Roll call vote: Schwartz, Neys, Marks, Houge, Woodward, Ova, and Marks voted aye. Motion carried.

Bertsch indicated there have been numerous problems with people camping at Parkhurst and not paying. People are taking advantage of the park and the Park Department is losing revenue because of it. Klose suggested having no overnight camping unless campers have a permit. Options will be reviewed and discussed this winter.

A request to transfer the cabin permit for Lot 13 West was received. Ova made a motion, seconded by Woodward to approve the transfer. Motion carried.

Jon Cameron, Western Regional Director, from Senator Hoeven’s office was present. Cameron was present to discuss a draft of the Jamestown Reservoir Land Conveyance Bill. The bill would allow current cabin permittees to purchase their cabin site within 5 years of passage of the bill. Any land that was not purchased by the cabin permittee would transfer to the County, who would then own the land. Ova made a motion, seconded by Schwartz to support the proposed bill. Motion carried.

Currently there is no Bureau of Reclamation grant fund money for the Pelican Point Campground Expansion Project. The County will have to wait until November to see if additional funds will be available.

Schwartz presented an update on the Jamestown Dredging project and 3 dredging options with different price ranges.

At 5:22 p.m., a motion to adjourn the Park Board meeting was made by Houge, seconded by Neys. Motion carried.

At 5:23 p.m., the Stutsman County Commission Meeting was called back to order.

Meland requested approval of sale of county-owned property for parcel #74-3460820. Schwartz made a motion to approve the sale, seconded by Marks. Roll call vote: Neys, Klose, Ova, Marks, and Schwartz voted aye. Motion carried.

Schwartz made a motion, seconded by Marks to approve the monthly bills. Roll call vote: Klose, Ova, Marks, Schwartz, and Neys voted aye. Motion carried.

At 6:00 p.m., Chairman Klose called the 2018 county budget and 2017 property tax levy hearing of the Stutsman County Commission to order. All commissioners were present.

The hearing was held on the proposed 2018 county budget. Interim Auditor/COO, Nicole Meland, reported on the 2018 budget.

The Mayor of Medina questioned if the taxes were going to go down. Meland stated that County taxes would be decreasing and made it clear that this budget hearing was for the County only and did not include City, School or Fire levy information.

Schwartz made a motion to adopt the 2018 proposed county budget and the 2017 property tax levy, seconded by Ova. Roll call vote: Ova, Marks, Schwartz, Neys, and Klose voted aye. Motion carried.

Ova made a motion, seconded by Neys to adopt the 2018 five year capital plan. Roll call vote: Marks, Schwartz, Neys, Klose, and Ova voted aye. Motion carried.

A motion to approve the 2018 budgeted transfers was made by Schwartz, seconded by Marks. Roll call vote: Schwartz, Neys, Klose, Ova, and Marks voted aye. Motion carried.

At 6:27 p.m., a motion to adjourn was made by Schwartz, seconded by Ova. Motion carried.
