

Official Proceedings of the Stutsman County Commission

October 4, 2011

At 4:00 p.m., Chairman Klose called the regular meeting of the Stutsman County Commission to order. Dennis Ova, Dale Marks, David Schwartz, Craig Neys and Mark T. Klose answered roll call.

A motion to approve the minutes from the September meetings was made by Schwartz and seconded by Ova. Motion carried.

The public hearing was held on the proposed Model "D" Floodplain Management Zoning Ordinance Amendment. Noel Johnson, Zoning Administrator, presented the amendment as approved by the Stutsman County Planning and Zoning Commission. Jerry Bergquist, 9-1-1 Coordinator/Emergency Manager, reviewed the amendment. He indicated that this would change the flood plain management ordinance from the emergency phase to the regular phase. Only property within a mapped area would be subject to the ordinance restrictions. Only a very small portion of the County south of Jamestown along the James River and a small area adjacent to Spiritwood Lake was mapped. The change would allow individuals to acquire up to \$250,000 in flood insurance protection. Nellie Degen supported the amendment as it would allow an opportunity for residents to acquire flood insurance protection before next spring. Schwartz made a motion seconded by Neys to approve the amendment. Roll call vote – Ova, Marks, Schwartz, Neys and Klose voted aye.

Bergquist presented a mutual aid agreement between the City of Jamestown and Stutsman County. Jim Ruether, Jamestown Fire Chief, indicated that the prior agreement had expired several years ago. The agreement ensures that any costs for the mutual aid will qualify for FEMA reimbursement. A motion was made by Ova seconded by Schwartz to approve the agreement. Roll call vote – Marks, Schwartz, Neys, Klose and Ova voted aye.

Bergquist requested approval of a contract with the ND Association of Counties and the ND League of Cities to conduct disaster training and to conduct a disaster exercise. Bergquist had a Homeland Security Grant to pay the \$20,500 contract fees. Neys made a motion seconded by Marks to approve the contract. Roll call vote – Schwartz, Neys, Klose, Ova and Marks voted aye.

Bergquist presented a draft of a letter to the Township Officers. The letter would inform the Townships of the upcoming Special Legislative Session. The State Emergency Management Office indicated that the Special Session would be addressing flood related issues. The townships may want to consider contacting their Legislators to inform them of the Township's financial difficulties dealing with FEMA projects and other road repairs caused by several consecutive years of abnormally high moisture, and to encourage them to propose legislation for funding assistance. Johnson requested permission to send a similar letter to the Governor outlining the County's and the Township's financial problems associated with the high water on County and Township roads. Marks made a motion seconded by Ova to authorize sending the letters. Motion carried.

Lindsay Larson, JSDC Marketing/Business Development Specialist, presented a funding request for the South Central Dakota Regional Council/Small Business Development Council for 2012. Marks made a motion seconded by Schwartz to pay \$11,914 from JSDC funds for the annual dues. Roll call vote – Neys, Klose, Ova, Marks and Schwartz voted aye.

Steve Thompson, Interstate Engineering, presented the advertisement for Requests for Proposals for engineering services for permanent repairs on the Emergency Relief projects. The RFP's were required to qualify for 80% reimbursement of the preliminary and construction engineering cost. A motion was made by Ova seconded by Marks to advertise for engineering services. Motion carried.

Schwartz made a motion seconded by Marks to hire Beaver Creek Archeology for the cultural resources investigation on the Great River Energy (GRE) paving project in Spiritwood Township at a cost of \$1,785. Roll call vote – Klose, Ova, Marks, Schwartz and Neys voted aye.

By consensus, the Commission authorized Thompson to contact subsoil consultants for boring estimates on the GRE road.

Mickey Nenow, County Highway Superintendent, gave his monthly report. He requested payment of the following bills for Emergency Repairs on County roads: RTS Shearing - project 47-5 - \$198,034.93; project 47-6 - \$134,130.65; project 47-12 - \$150,318.56; Lindberg Brothers, Inc. - project 47-1 - \$315,181.15; Border States Paving Inc. - Gavilon Road paving - \$512,757.24. Schwartz made a motion seconded by Marks to pay the bills. Roll call vote – Ova, Marks, Schwartz, Neys and Klose voted aye.

Nenow requested permission to send 5 blade operators to a training class in Jamestown at a cost of \$40 per man. Ova made a motion seconded by Neys to approve the request. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Neys seconded by Ova to authorize out-of-state travel for road department personnel and commissioners to attend the Regional Local Roads Conference in Rapid City, SD, October 25th through the 27th. Motion carried.

Commissioner Schwartz reported that the Water Board had approved a request to allow a drain to lower water on County Road 43. The drain was in and the water was off the road.

Commissioner Marks expressed concerns over depleted gravel pits. Nenow responded that no gravel had been crushed this year. The bids for crushing would expire which would allow the County to rebid the gravel crushing for next year.

Johnson reviewed the Federal Aid report from the ND DOT. Stutsman County would have \$1,753,294 in the Federal Aid account in 2012. The County's Matching Federal Aid fund would have about \$1.4 million. These funds could be used for a paving project. Ova made a motion seconded by Neys to push potential projects back another year and certify the same projects for 2013, 2014 and 2016. Motion carried. The certification was non-binding – the Commission could add or change any projects on the list.

Fritz Fremgen, State's Attorney, reviewed his monthly report. The time had expired for a potential appeal by Margo Haut. Ashley Heitkamp, Assistant State's Attorney, continued to work on Title VI compliance issues. The additional District Judge in Jamestown helped to increase case closings and reduce the number of cases pending. Bounced checks were down, but identity theft was up.

Toni Hible, Director of Tax Equalization, requested out-of-state travel for her and the staff appraiser to attend a one day educational seminar in Cohasset, Minnesota. Ova made a motion seconded by Neys to approve the request and to authorize payment of the \$55 per person registration fees. Motion carried.

Tracey Trapp, LEC Administrator, requested out-of-state travel for the LEC nurse and her assistant to attend the American Correctional Health Services Association Conference in St Cloud, Minnesota, November 2nd and 3rd. Schwartz made a motion seconded by Ova to authorize the travel and the \$100 per person registration fees. Motion carried.

Nellie Degen, a cabin owner, addressed the proposed increase in cabin permit fees. She and her husband were requesting that the seasonal permit fees be increased over the Bureau of Reclamations proposed amount. She wanted to go on record that the proposed fee structure and past fees were not fair and could be considered discriminatory when compared to the amount charged to the year-around permit holders (\$2,360 for year-around and \$983 seasonal (7 months)). The Bureau had indicated to her that the fees could not be less than recommended but they could be more. She proposed that the seasonal rate be half of the year-around rate. The increased rates would generate about \$6,000 in additional revenue for the Park Board.

At 5:14 p.m., the Commission meeting was recessed for the Park Board meeting.

Stutsman County Park Board Meeting

October 4, 2011

At 5:20 p.m. Chairman Klose called the Stutsman County Park Board meeting to order. Park Board members present were Dennis Ova, Dale Marks, David Schwartz, Craig Neys, Mark Klose, Mark Schlecht and Bob Woodward.

A motion to approve the minutes from the September meeting was made by Neys and seconded by Woodward. Motion carried.

Woodward made a motion seconded by Schlecht to pay the following bills. Roll call vote - Woodward, Schlecht, Ova, Marks, Schwartz, Neys and Klose voted aye.

Johnson reported that the concessionaire contract for Pelican Point Landing would expire this year. The current contract provided for suspension of some of the contract terms as deemed necessary for visitor safety, health and enjoyment of the area. In his opinion, this provision would allow the Park Board to suspend the term of the contract due to the high water since 2009. The current concessionaires at Pelican Point and at the Marina have had very difficult financial problems due to the high water since 2009. The Board could consider extending the contract to the current concessionaire or they could solicit proposals for a new contract. The campground committee would meet with the concessionaires and the Bureau of Reclamation to consider extending the concessionaire’s contracts and report back to the full Board.

Nellie Degen addressed the Park Board and made the same request as she had made to the County Commission. The permit fee structure was not fair. The seasonal fees should be half of the year around fees.

Ron Qual, representing the Cabin Owners Association, expressed concerns over the continual rise in permit fees. Where would the increases end - the fees should be capped. Because of the high water, the cabin owners had no use of their frontage and had to deal with damages to their property due to the high water. Their association wanted to go on record opposing the fee increases.

Sandy Eckelberg, Accounts and Property Coordinator, reported that the permit fees were due by the end of the year. She had to give a 60 day notice to cabin owners. The Board needed to make a decision soon to meet the deadlines. The Bureau recommended an increase from \$1,930 to \$2,360 for year around and from \$800 to \$983 for seasonal. The higher rates had been recommended for last year, but the Board had been catching up with the recommended fees for several years.

Nellie Degen commented that the rates could not be less than the Bureau recommended, but they could be more.

Ron Qual indicated he had a year around permit, but he was not in favor of raising his neighbor’s permit fees – leave as recommended by the Bureau.

Schlecht made a motion seconded by Woodward to set the permit fees at \$2,360 for year around and \$983 for seasonal. Roll call vote – Woodward - aye, Ova - aye, Marks - nay, Schwartz - nay, Neys - nay, Klose - nay, Schlecht - aye. Motion failed.

Schwartz made a motion to set the permit rates at \$2,360 for year around and \$1080 for seasonal. The motion died for lack of a second.

Woodward made a motion seconded by Ova to table consideration until the next meeting and to talk to Scott Hettinger at the Bureau of Reclamation. Motion carried.

Dennis Lorenz gave his monthly report. He requested permission to buy a truck at a truck auction. The purchase was in next years’ budget. Ova made a motion seconded by Schlecht to authorize up to \$10,000 for the purchase of a used truck. Motion carried.

Lorenz reported that the campgrounds were closed for the season. His crew would try and install a high water boat ramp at the boat club yet this fall. A HazMat review had recommended better signage.

Ron Qual indicated that the grade raise on the west side cabin access road would not be done this year due to high estimates and high water. The money would be saved until next year.

At 6:05 p.m. a motion to adjourn was made by Ova and seconded by Woodward. Motion carried.

At 6:10 p.m., the regular Commission meeting was called back to order with all Commissioners present.

A motion was made by Marks seconded by Schwartz to approve the bills for payment. Roll call vote - Ova, Marks, Schwartz, Neys and Klose voted aye.

The hearing was held on the proposed 2012 budget. Johnson reported on the changes in the budgets from 2011, the proposed 2011 mill levy and the projection of 2012 ending fund balance. The County would deficit spend \$2.9 million and have a mill levy of 114.44 mills for 2011 compared to a 114.51 mill levy for 2010.

Cliff Kropp questioned the value increase on farm land. Johnson stated that the Legislature required an increase in value of 9%. For 2012 and beyond the productivity of the land and land use will be used to determine the value of land for tax purposes. Kropp also wondered when the increases were going to stop – everyone wants more but don't want to pay for it.

Scott Harms requested Johnson to explain the difference in Fund 22 and Fund 58. Johnson stated that Fund 22 (Emergency Fund) was for an emergency and could only be spent in a case of a declared disaster. Fund 58 (Emergency Human Services) was another fund to generate more money for Social Services and could be spent for Social Services related expenses only. Johnson stated that the General Fund was the only un-restricted use fund, all others were restricted – specific use only.

Degen questioned the County's authority to tax the land owned by the Bureau of Reclamation that is leased by the cabin owners. The Bureau pays in lieu taxes on their land and the cabin owners pay property taxes on the same land. Johnson responded that State law allows possessory interest assessment on the leasehold interests of land leased from otherwise property tax exempt government owned land.

Harms asked about the Measure #2 that will be on the statewide ballot in June. The measure would eliminate all property taxes. Johnson stated that facts regarding the impact on the measure on County

and local governments, in an unbiased manner, would be presented to the public to allow the voters to make an informed decision on the measure.

A motion was made by Ova seconded by Marks to approve the 2012 budget as presented. Roll call vote - Marks, Schwartz, Neys, Klose and Ova voted aye.

A motion to adjourn was made by Schwartz seconded by Neys. At 6:47 p.m. the meeting was adjourned.
